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



PUBLIC SPIRITED CITIZEN

The most of our readers will recognize the accompanying face: C. H. Engle was born in West Almond, Alleghany Co. N. Y., in 1832. He came to Michigan for the first time in 1855. There was at that time no postoffice or schoolhouse here. He was admitted to the bar of Van Buren county in 1875. He came to this state intending to teach school, which avocation he was engaged in the previous year. But admiring the beautiful timbered lands of western Michigan, he purchased one hundred and sixty acres of section ten in this

township, just north of Paw Paw river On this land he built a log cabin 10x12 feet, in which he and his hired man batched it during the following winter, cutting sawlogs to stock the Cross & Andrews sawmill, which had just been completed, since which time it has been converted into a gristmill, having been run many years by the Anderson Brothers,

The following spring he returned to his home in New York. Again returning to Michigan the following fall he continued lumbering during the winter of 1857, making his headquarters at Stoughton's corners, then a rival town of Hartford, with Mr. Stoughton, the father of Mrs. Hurlbut residing in this village. Returning to New York again the following spring he married Helen J. McGibeny, of his native place, moving to Michigan in the fall accompanied by his brother, Dr. W. A. Engle, of this place, who occupies the same house in Van Buren county. house the two brothers built in the fall of 1857.

Mr. Engle tells us that he and his young wife of eighteen years kept popular work. house for the first time where Mr. Ira W. Allen and wife, who were then, still Wallace and Cynthia Allen and the old house as well, holds a sacred place in his heart.

His wife joined the M. E. class of this place when it first organized and for twenty years she was organist and leading soprano of the church. Many ploneers will recall how there were but few funerals near this place that her sympathetic voice was not heard in song. She died in September, 1881, leaving three children. Her oldest, Allie I. Engle, who has been principal of the Allegan high school for several years; John A. Engle, drygoods salesman of Dowagiac, and Clara L. Nobles. the youngest, residing at Fremont. Neb.

Victory Is Complete. Havana, Jan. 3.-All the returns of Tuesday's election have not yet been received, but the central board announces that 55 Palmaites will be in the house of representatives and eight Masoites. The composition of the senate is unknown, but in Matanzas, Havana, and Santa Clara provinces all the senators will be supporters of Senor Palma. Of the six governors elected five belong to the Palma party.
