



## EARTHQUAKE SHAKES MAINE

### Vibrations More Severe Than on Former Occasions, But No Severe Damage Was Done.

Portland, Me., July 17.-An éarthnake shock affecting a large portion. of Maine occurred at 5:10 a. m. Saturtay and was noticeable for about ten seconds. It was said to have been more severe than the spocks of March 21, 1904, which occurred about one a. m. Saturday's trembling awoke many people from sound sleep. It was reported from Bangor to Kittery, and from above Farmington to the coast at Rockland, and seemed most severe

in central Maine, especially at Augusta and Waterville. Reports of the quaking were received from Kittery, York, Biddeford, Portland. Brunswick, Lewiston, Augusta, Waterville, Rumford Falls, Farmington, Skowhegan, Rockland, Belfast and Bangor, also Manchester and Concord. in New Hampshire.

First, let us not forget that we are permitting dens of vice in all our cities where men and women congregate and breed crime. Public indifference to crime is another cause. We regard burglaries and highway robberies as mere incidents of city life. Very often complaining witnesses refuse or neglect to prosecute.

If our country is to be saved from the wreck that is threatened by the spirit of rampant lawlessness and the reckless disregard of authority, then everyone, both high and low, rich and poor, must be taught that he shall obey the law.
