## Youth Tracked through Snow Held in Robbery

Alfred R. Baldwin, Hartford, waived examination this morning before Justice Glenn Huey at Paw Paw on charges of breaking and entering. He was bound to circuit court. Baldwin was arrested early this morning about an hour after Leo's Service station a mile west of Hartford was entered.

Proprietor Leo Chaney told police that he discovered the entry when he returned at 2:15 a. m. to check fires. Chaney found a cigaret machine smashed and the back door open. Entry had been gained by breaking a window.

Chaney called Officer Hugh Spaulding, who radioed state police, Spaulding and Troopers Robert Buchanan and Frank Pierce went to the station, from where Buchanan tracked footprints through the snow to Baldwin's home.

Baldwin at first denied that he had broken into the station but admitted it after an hour of questioning. Police recovered \$1.35 of the money taken from the cigaret machine. Chaney estimated that \$10 to 15 was in the machine.

Baldwin said, according to police, that he was frightened from the building by a car driving into the station and lost some of the money while running across the fields.

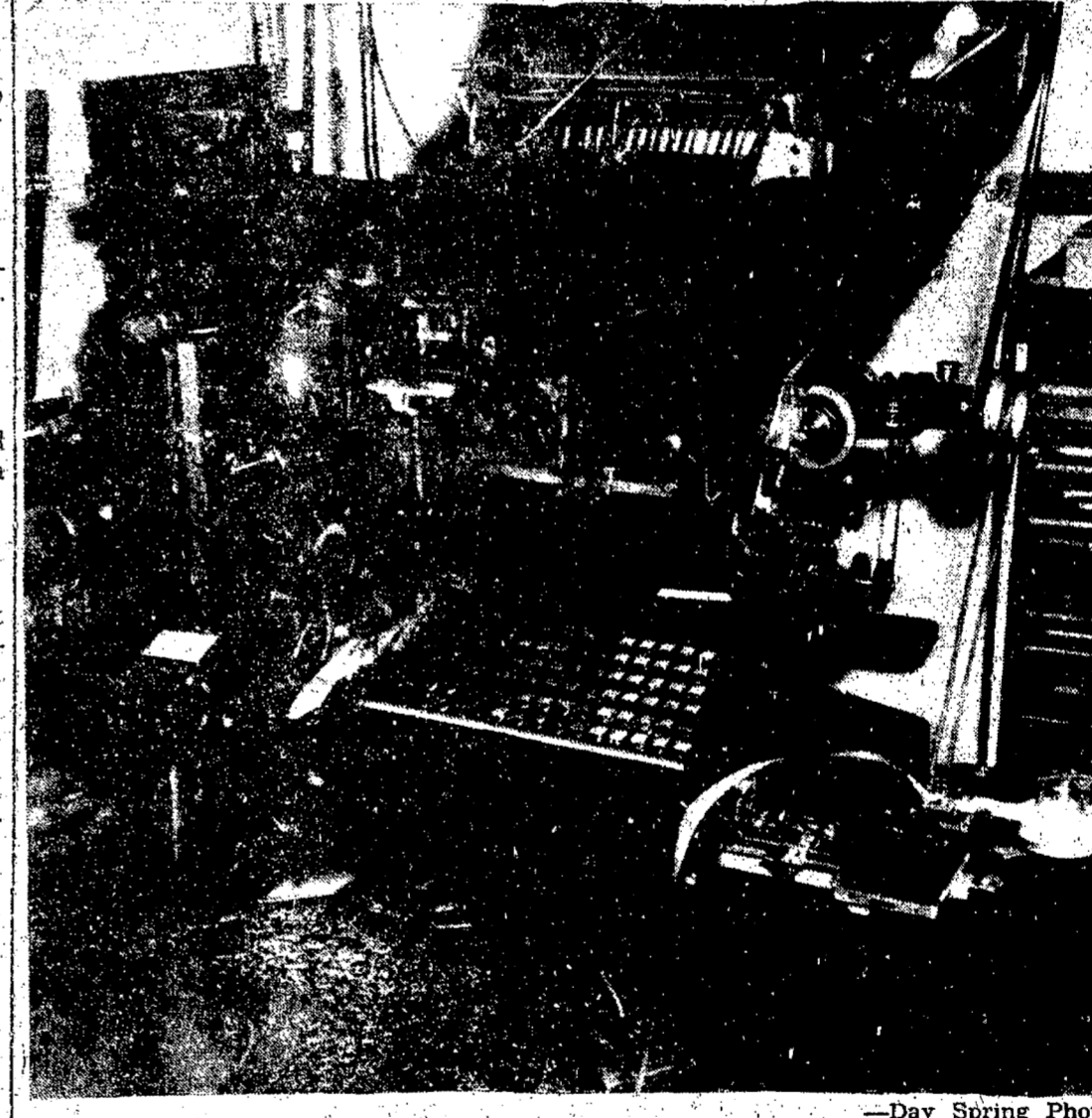

## Holes in Paper Tape Produce Type Rapidly



This is the perforator part of new Teletypesetter equipment installed by The Day Spring this week. The machine has a keyboard like a typewriter, punches holes in a paper tape. Lewis Holtz,

Teletypesetter Corp. representative, is pictured instructing Miss MaryAnn Szcwczk in operation of the perforator. He points to an indicator which shows when enough letters have been placed in a line.



The Day Spring's typesetting machine now produces type without having an operator at the keyboard. The trick is the Teletypesetter operating unit, which may be seen at the right side of the keyboard in the picture. Feeding

into it is a strip of paper tape which has been perforated on another machine in The Day Spring office. Lines of type which come out of the machine automatically may be seen at the left of the picture.

## Paper Adopts New Type Face for Front Page

**Automatic Typesetter Installed by Day Spring; Now Most Modern Weekly in Area**

With installation of automatic typesetting equipment, The Day Spring this week adopts a new type dress for its front page body type.

The installation is the second modernization step taken by The Day Spring in the last four months. A Ludlow typograph machine, which provided a new type face for headlines throughout the paper, was installed early in December.

The new type face for the front page is named Excelsior and matches the body type used elsewhere in the paper. It is a larger, more legible face than the Cheltenham which it replaces.

The automatic typesetting equipment which was installed this week, called Teletypesetter, replaces manual operation of the Linotype machine for producing all of the body type for the paper. Lewis Holtz of the Teletypesetter company began installation of the equipment as soon as last week's edition was printed and has been here throughout the week instructing personnel in its use.

The Teletypesetter equipment includes two machines, a perforator and an operating unit. The perforator is an office machine with a keyboard similar to that of a typewriter. It punches holes in a continuous paper tape. Combinations of six holes produce all letters of the alphabet, numbers and punctuation marks, in addition to the various sizes of spaces used in a typesetting machine.

The perforated paper tape is fed automatically into the operating unit, which is attached to the typesetting machine. Small pins "read" the perforations in the tape and accordingly actuate the keys of the typesetting machine. The equipment provides more rapid and continuous operation of the Linotype than is possible manually.

Installation of Teletypesetters is growing rapidly in weekly newspapers. The Day Spring is the fifth Michigan weekly to add the equipment since November. This newspaper now is the most highly mechanized weekly in southern Michigan, being the only one equipped with Ludlow, Teletypesetter and a web press.

The new type face put into use today completes a modernization that has changed the typography of The Day Spring from an assortment of half a dozen type faces to one type for text matter and two type styles for headlines.

To compare the new with the old, this story is set in the new type face. Following is a paragraph from last week's issue set in the former type face:

One use for the tape might be a lace with a black ribbon drawn through the top row of holes to draw it up into a pretty ruffle. Or since it is made of such nice stencil material, I'm tempted to use a piece of it as a stencil with textile paints and decorate an apron or a blouse with sayings that no one can read unless they, too, are nuts, and can read teletype tape.

What things people won't dream up just in the hope of a bit of leisure.

2 cups fresh shredded pineapple  
2 cups fresh sliced strawberries  
15 to 20 marshmallows  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1 cup heavy whipping cream

Place fruit in bowl. Cut marshmallows into small pieces. For free and easy cutting, dip scissors into water occasionally. Combine

marshmallows and fruit. Chill. Add lemon juice. Whip cream. Add sugar and fold into fruit mixture just before serving.

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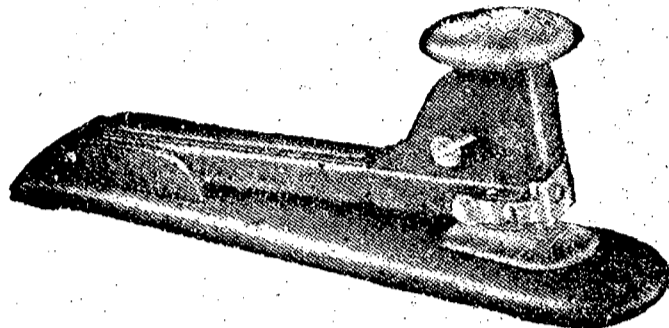

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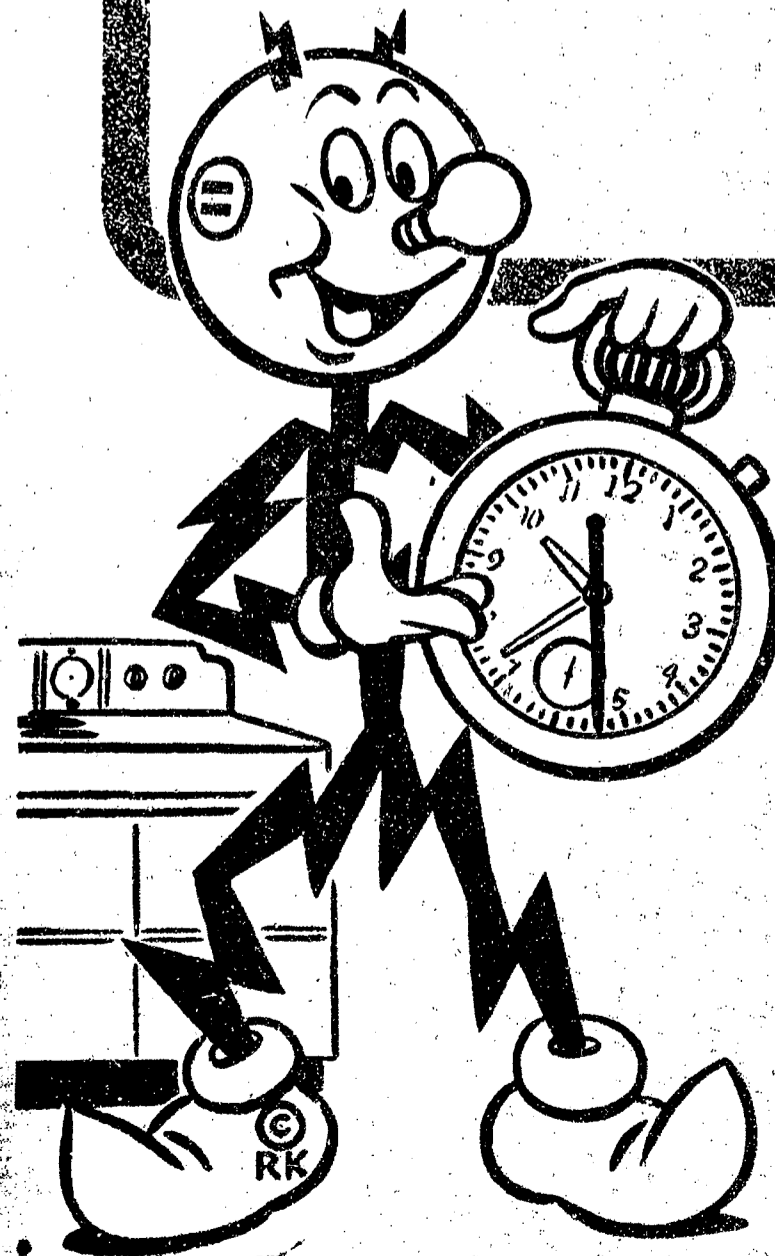
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### Local Students Go to Latin Meeting

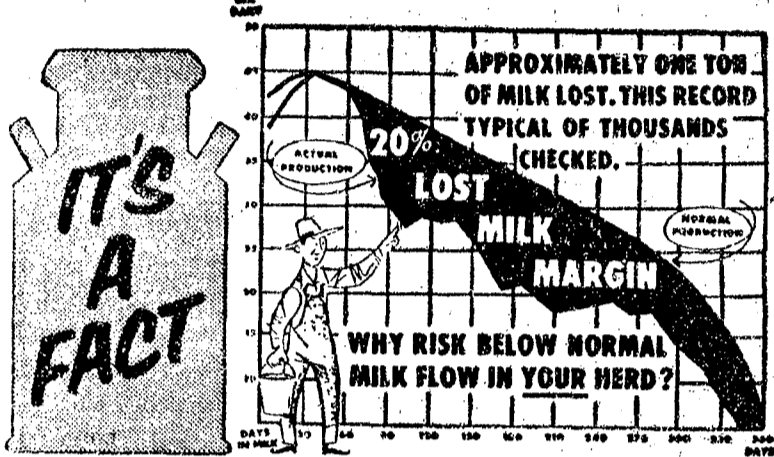

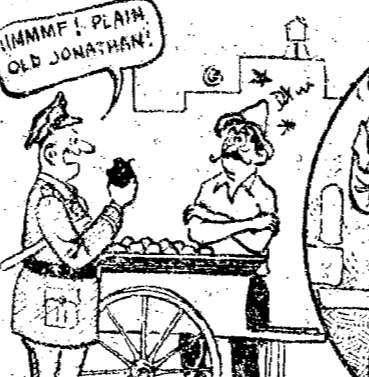

**Wayne U. Professor Says Women Manage World's Biggest Business**  
Wayne University freshman, Barbara Fruitman of Flint, discusses budget problems with Dr. Raymond J. Murphy of Wayne's School of Business Administration who is moderator of a TV show on "Stretching Your Dollars."  
American women are actively engaged in the biggest business in the world—the "big business" of home management.  
Homemakers spent about 230 billion dollars last year on goods and services alone—three times the total federal budget of 1953. Few people realize that women own or control approximately 60% of all corporate stock, 70% of all wealth and 90% of all consumer buying, says Dr. Raymond J. Murphy, associate professor of business law in the Wayne University School of Business Administration.  
Dr. Murphy, an experienced management counselor, moderates a series of programs designed to answer the average homemaker's practical questions about wise budgeting and investment over WJBK-TV, Detroit. Produced by the Wayne University television staff, the 15-minute shows are broadcast Saturday mornings at 11 a.m.  
Because we recognize that women in this country are responsible for spending huge portions of the family pay check in home management, we are glad to help them find new ways to stretch their dollars, Dr. Murphy said.  
Many people dislike the word budget, but some type of financial system must operate in every household that hopes to pay its bills and still come out ahead.  
No one can tell you exactly how you should spend your money, Dr. Murphy points out, since no two families have the same expenses, but all must pay for food, clothing and housing.  
Dr. Murphy believes the first step in setting up a budget is to make an analysis of the family needs which should be agreed upon by the entire family. Next, the total anticipated income should be noted. Deduct from this the fixed expenses (housing, education, utilities, taxes, insurance, etc.); variable expenses (clothing, health, home furnishings, recreation, emergency funds, etc.); and day to day expenses (food, household supplies, entertainment, and transportation). The balance is the savings which should be incorporated in the plans for the future.  
Careful planning and wise spending, Dr. Murphy stresses, should help lead to a happy home life.
