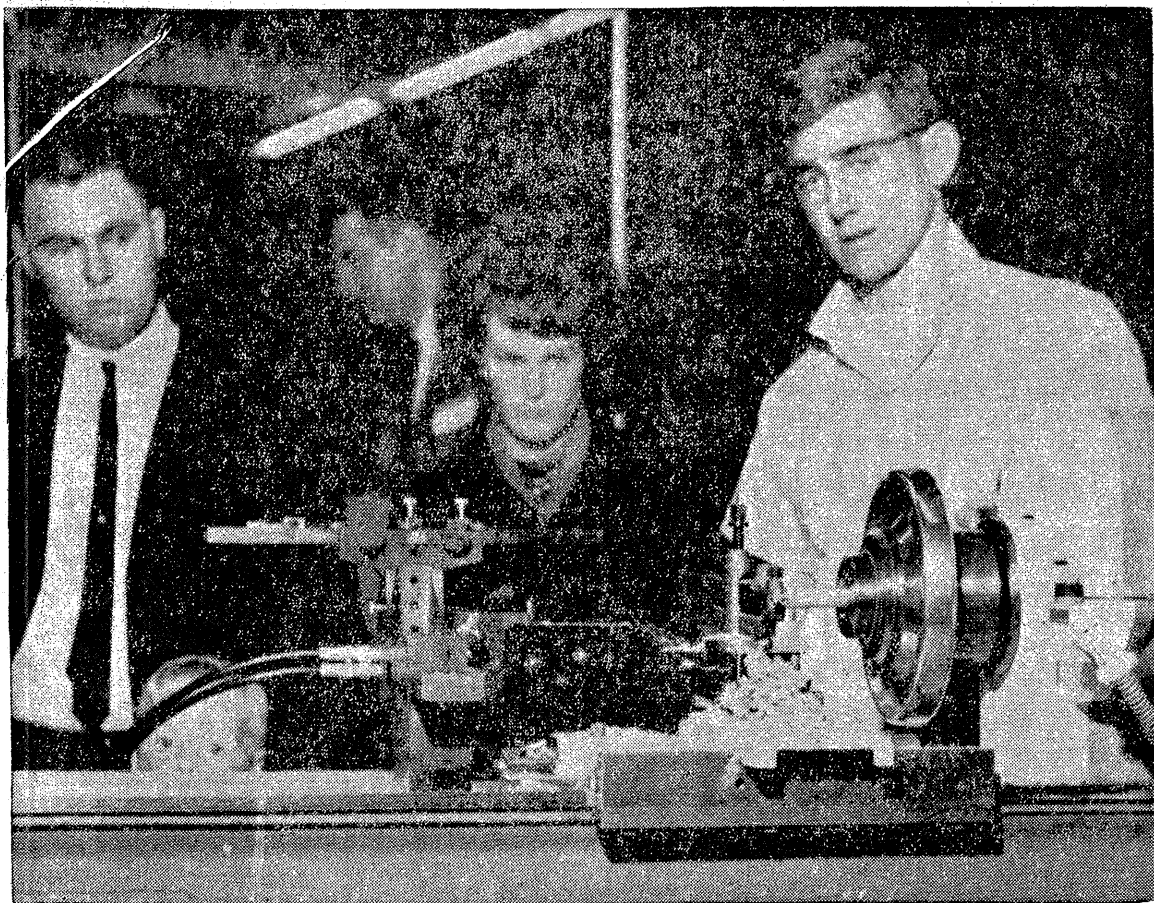

## 3 contests in area for school posts

There will be contests at Lawrence, Hartford and Coloma for the June 13 school election, but no opposition at Watervliet.

Kenneth McComb and Earl Kabel will compete at Lawrence for the school board seat now held by Gerald Hutchins, who did not seek reelection.

At Hartford, John Righter and Roger Duncombe will compete for the seat Duncombe now holds. Hartford is the only one of the four districts in which two members of the board are to be elected next month. Jack Leach is opposed for election to the remainder of Nicholas Obrig's term. Obrig resigned when he moved out of the district, and Leach was appointed to succeed him.

At Coloma, John Walter, board president, will seek reelection and will be opposed by Mrs. Irene Stankiewicz and Frank Kolesar.

At Watervliet, Merle Bujack is the lone candidate as he seeks reelection to the board.

## Local units receive state road funds

Weight and gas tax money from the motor vehicle highway fund has been distributed to area governments by the State Highway department for use on local roads and streets. The Berrien county road commission received \$680,536 and the Van Buren road commission \$339,084.

Payments to towns include Lawrence \$4,677, Hartford \$8,471, Watervliet \$6,806, Coloma \$6,777, Decatur \$7,531, Bangor \$8,716, Lawton \$7,526, Paw Paw \$11,677.

## Fire sweeps landmark farm home

HARTFORD — Elga Danneffel had a narrow escape Sunday morning when fire destroyed most of the second story of his farm home south of Hartford.

Danneffel told The Day Spring that he was awakened at about 5 a.m., either by smoke or crackling of flames. Smoke prevented him from reaching the telephone, and he ran next door to call the Hartford Fire department.

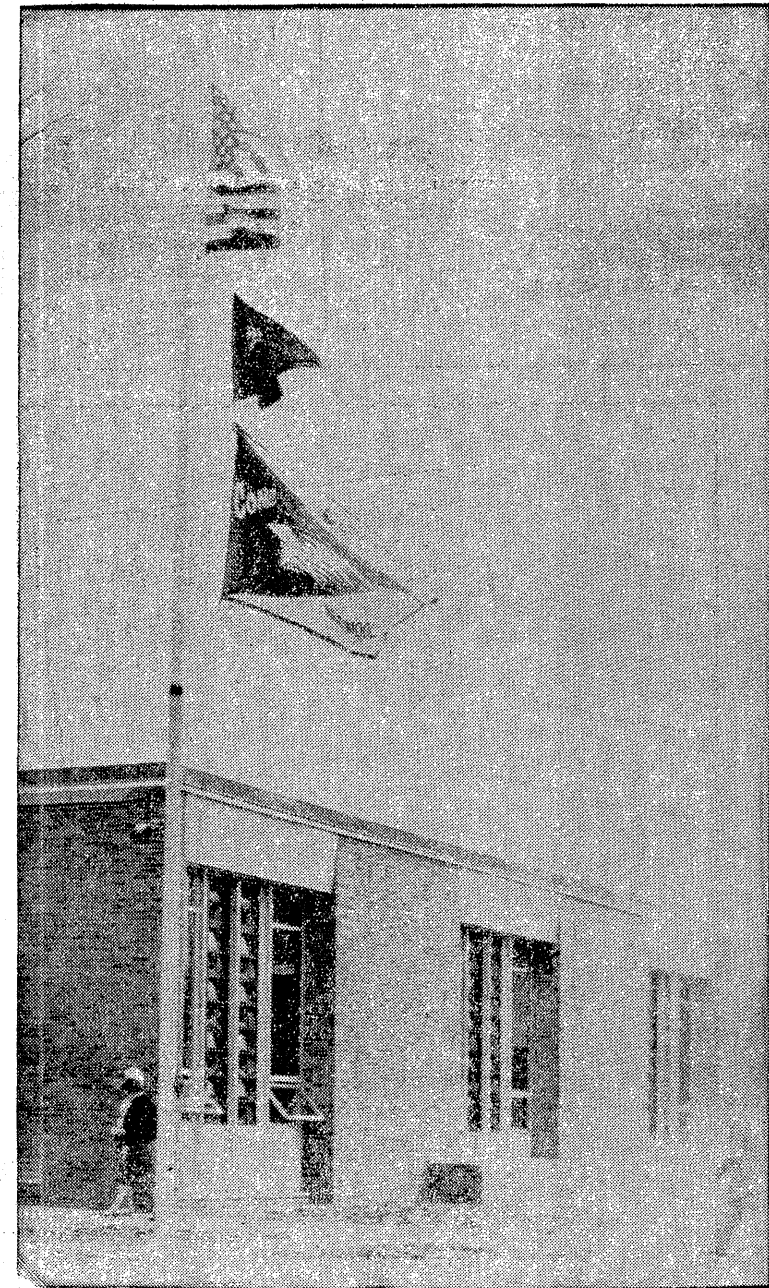
Danneffel and an unidentified youth passing by used garden hoses which he keeps connected to outside taps, on the blaze until firemen arrived. The Keeler Fire department was called to assist in controlling the fire.

Danneffel was alone in the house where the fire broke out. Mrs. Danneffel was visiting relatives at Fort Wayne, Ind.

Fire Chief Harold Walker said that apparently accumulated soot in an inside chimney caught fire and ignited the building through cracks in the chimney. Firemen kept the blaze from breaking thru the building except at a couple of points at the rear of the structure. Only the kitchen was spared from heavy damage.

Danneffel is an accomplished trap shooter and his gun collection escaped the flames. Three of his guns were in his car, and the others in a kitchen cabinet, where they were unharmed.

The house has been an area landmark for years. The Danneffel farm is the former Hugh Warren farm and has been in Mrs. Danneffel's family for years. Many of her parents' keepsakes were lost or damaged in the fire.

## Van Buren summer dental clinics set

Nine other clinics are scheduled in the county from May 23 through Aug. 11. The program is conducted by the county Health department in cooperation with dentists and school authorities.

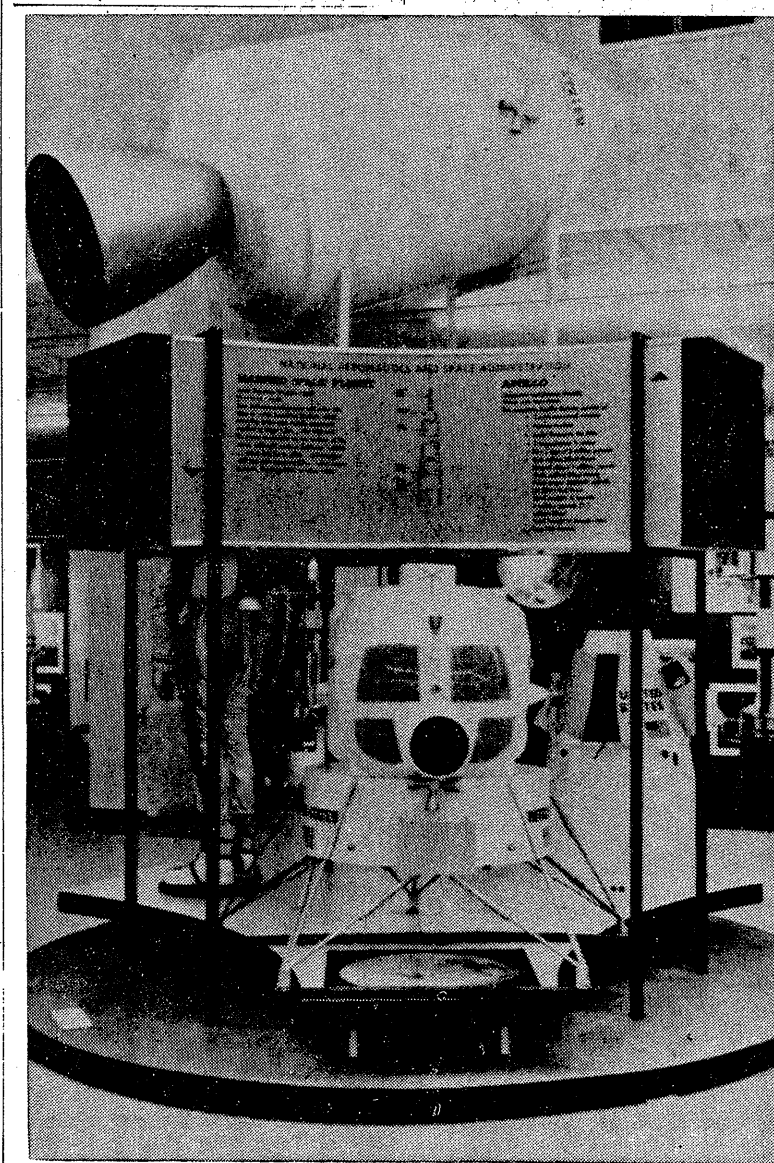

graders, high school students and adult art classes. The exhibits are open to the public without charge. (Day Spring photo).

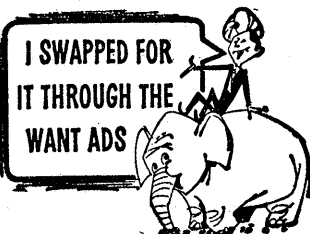
### GARDEN CLUB TO MEET

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### To honor two retiring teachers

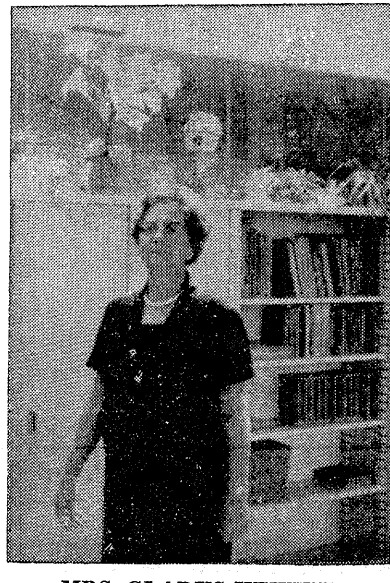

### TOWNSHIP OF LAWRENCE ORDINANCE NUMBER 2 JUNK YARD ORDINANCE LAWRENCE TOWNSHIP

ORDINANCE, to provide for the control and licensing of junk yards and places for the dismantling, wrecking, and disposing of junk and-or refuse material of automobiles, located in said township outside of incorporated areas, to provide for an annual license fee, to provide for suitable rules and regulations for the operation of licensed lots to protect the general health and welfare of the township.

The Township of Lawrence, Van Buren County Michigan, acting pursuant to Act 12 of the Public Acts of 1929 as amended, (M.S.A. 19.731) hereby ordains:

1. That the junk yards and places for the dismantling, wrecking and disposing of junk and-or refuse material of automobiles, outside of the incorporated areas of the township shall be licensed and controlled under M.S.A. 19.731 in the interest of the public health and general welfare of the Township.

2. That, after the effective date of this ordinance, it shall be illegal for any person, co-partnership, or corporation, or other unit, to operate, maintain, or control any junk yard or place for the dismantling, wrecking and disposing of junk and-or refuse material of automobiles unless and until the same is licensed hereunder.

3. A license fee paid annually on the 1st day of March shall be paid by each applicant in the sum of \$25.00. The fee shall accompany the application for a license, and in case the application is refused, the Board shall direct the Clerk to return the fee to the applicant.

4. The form of the application shall be as follows: STATE OF MICHIGAN COUNTY OF VAN BUREN TOWNSHIP OF LAWRENCE Application for license to operate a junk yard, and place for dismantling, wrecking and disposing of the junk and-or refuse material of automobiles.

1. Name of applicant. 2. Co-partnership, individual, or corporation. 3. Location of proposed lot. 4. Names of all parties who will have an interest in said lot.

5. Is the lot fenced? 6. If State license is required, has one been applied for? 7. Number of Secretary of State's License held by applicant.

8. Has the applicant and party proposing to operate the lot ever been refused a license of this nature elsewhere? 9. Has the applicant and the party proposing to operate the lot ever been convicted of a felony? 10. Amount of fee accompanying the application.

The applicant shall deliver to the Township Clerk with the application and fee, a signed paper from 65 per cent of the freeholders residing within a one-half mile radius of said proposed lot stating whether they have objections to the issuance of the license. The Board shall be the sole judges of whether the required 65 per cent of the freeholders in the area have indicated their wishes, and whether said requirement has been met. If the said statement does not fulfill this requirement, the Board shall hold the application in abeyance until the applicant complies therewith.

5. The Board may grant the license if it deems same to be proper, or the Board may order a hearing on the application and after hearing, for just cause, in its discretion, refuse to grant the license provided for herein, in which case the fee shall be returned to the applicant. The said hearings shall be public hearings, and the Board may avail itself of any aid of public officials thereon or may employ investigators who shall report at the public hearing. At said hearing the Board may employ counsel to present the facts and advise it on questions of law; and the applicant may be represented by legal counsel.

6. Any license so granted shall specify that the sale of used cars is prohibited under the license, and that so to sell used cars requires a license issued by the Township for said used car lot, separate and apart from this license.

7. In the interest of public health and to protect the general welfare and to promote the same, to reduce thefts and to avoid making attractive nuisances of said lots, the Board hereby adopts the following rules and regulations for its guidance in approving all applications for the operation of all said licensed premises.

a. Each applicant shall have license issued by the State if one is so required by law; and if one is so required, action on this application shall be adjourned until

same is issued by the requisite state authority.

b. Each premise to be licensed shall be enclosed by a fence of suitable height to prevent prowlers from gaining access thereto, to keep children from playing upon the premises and to provide security for the lot. Each licensee shall keep the fence in good condition and repair at all times and failure to so maintain the fence shall be cause for revocation of the license or refusal to renew same. The fence adjacent to highway shall be no closer than 75 feet from centerline thereof. A suitable fence must be a light board, or equivalent material, fence 8 feet in height with the enclosure being properly fenced to hide all junk from adjoining properties.

c. Each premise to be licensed shall by its owners be shown to be able to be maintained in such a manner as to preclude undue fire hazards to itself and adjoining lands. All premises shall be kept clean and orderly so that no fire or health menace may arise from their operation. If such health or fire hazard arises, the Board may revoke the license or in proper case refuse to renew the same.

d. No person or persons shall be allowed to use any used or second hand car for living quarters, and if any vehicle on a licensed lot have its license revoked on being convicted thereof.

e. No persons shall be allowed to live within the confines of said lot, and if the licensee desires to live adjacent to the lot, living quarters shall be separate and apart from the lot.

f. Each person or applicant shall be of good repute.

g. Each applicant and licensee shall make the required reports to the Michigan State Police and other governmental agencies as required by law, and failure to so report shall be grounds for revocation of the license or refusal to renew same.

h. The Board reserves the right to revoke any license, for violation of its rules after hearing given the licensee, and the licensee shall be notified of said hearing at least 10 days prior thereto, and shall receive notice thereof by U.S. Mail.

i. The Board shall call a hearing on any licensee if 5 per cent of the freeholders within a half-mile radius of the licensed premises shall file objections in writing with the Board against the operation of the licensed premises.

j. It shall be ground for revocation of the license if licensee shall operate a junk yard or place for dismantling and wrecking of autos in any location other than that licensed herein.

k. The Board shall not be required to give notice of grounds for its refusal to renew the license, but in any case of renewal, shall grant a hearing if the licensee shall demand same in writing.

8. In case of revocation of license, the licensee shall not be entitled to any return of his fee.

9. The Board shall at all times have the right to cause investigations to be made of the licensed premises to ascertain if the rules and regulations hereunder are being adhered to.

10. A majority of the Board voting on any application or revocation of same shall govern and be the action of the Board.

11. The form of the license shall be: TOWNSHIP OF LAWRENCE Van Buren County, Michigan License to Operate a Junk Yard The Township of Lawrence acting under Act 12, Public Acts of 1929 as amended hereby licenses \_\_\_\_\_ to operate a junk yard and-or place for the dismantling, wrecking and disposing of junk and-or refuse material of automobiles a) \_\_\_\_\_ (said location only) in said township for period expiring on the \_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 19\_\_.

License non-transferable License revocable License Fee \_\_\_\_\_ This is Not A license for Operation of a Used Car Lot.

Lawrence Township Clerk 12. Penalty: Any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be punished by fine not exceeding \$100.00 or by imprisonment in the County Jail not to exceed 90 days or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court. The Board may also bring Civil action through the Circuit Court for the County of Van Buren.

13. Validity: Should any section, clause or provision of this Ordinance be declared invalid, the same

Ordinance as a whole or any part thereof, other than the part so declared to be invalid.

14. Repeal: All Ordinances and resolutions in conflict with any of the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed, except that this Ordinance in no way amends the Lawrence Township Zoning Ordinance.

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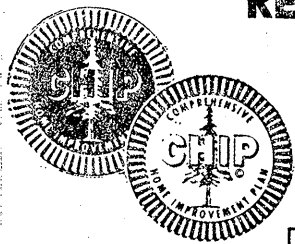

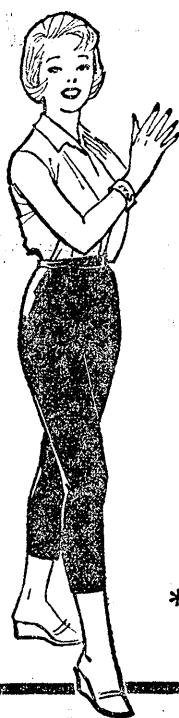

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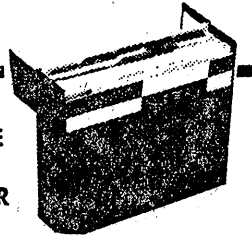

William Fries underwent surgery this morning at Community hospital on a foot which he injured last night while working with a power lawnmower.

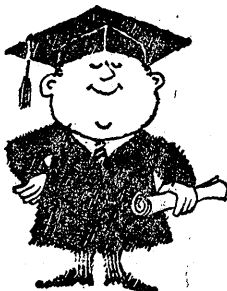
**Twenty-Five Years Ago**

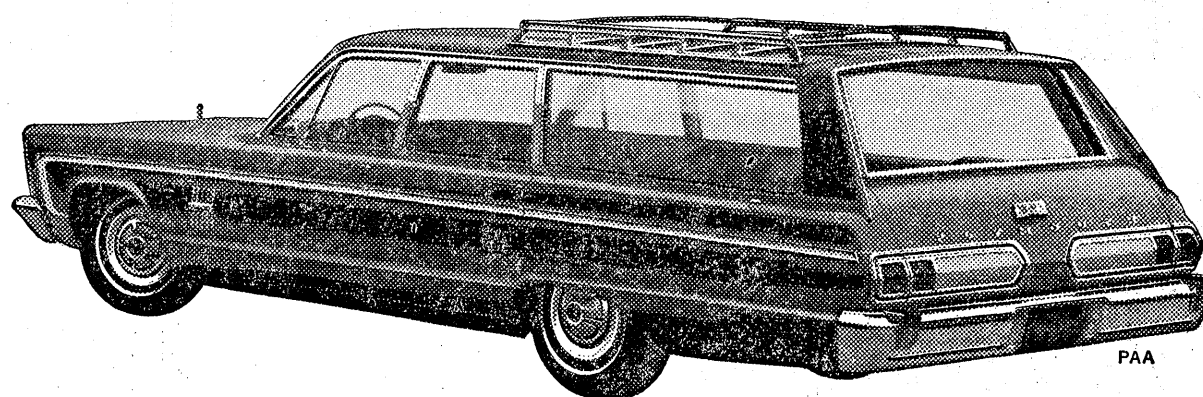

**Scuba divers  
need physical  
exams first**

"No skindiver of SCUBA fan should enter the water without a rigid physical examination," warns Dr. Thomas N. Markham, resident in industrial health at the University of Michigan medical center. "The medical hazards of diving are poorly understood by a large group of civilian divers and frequently by private physicians," he said. For this reason an examination by the local private physician may not be sufficient. Rather the examination should be conducted by a physician thoroughly familiar with the specific dangers of the sport.

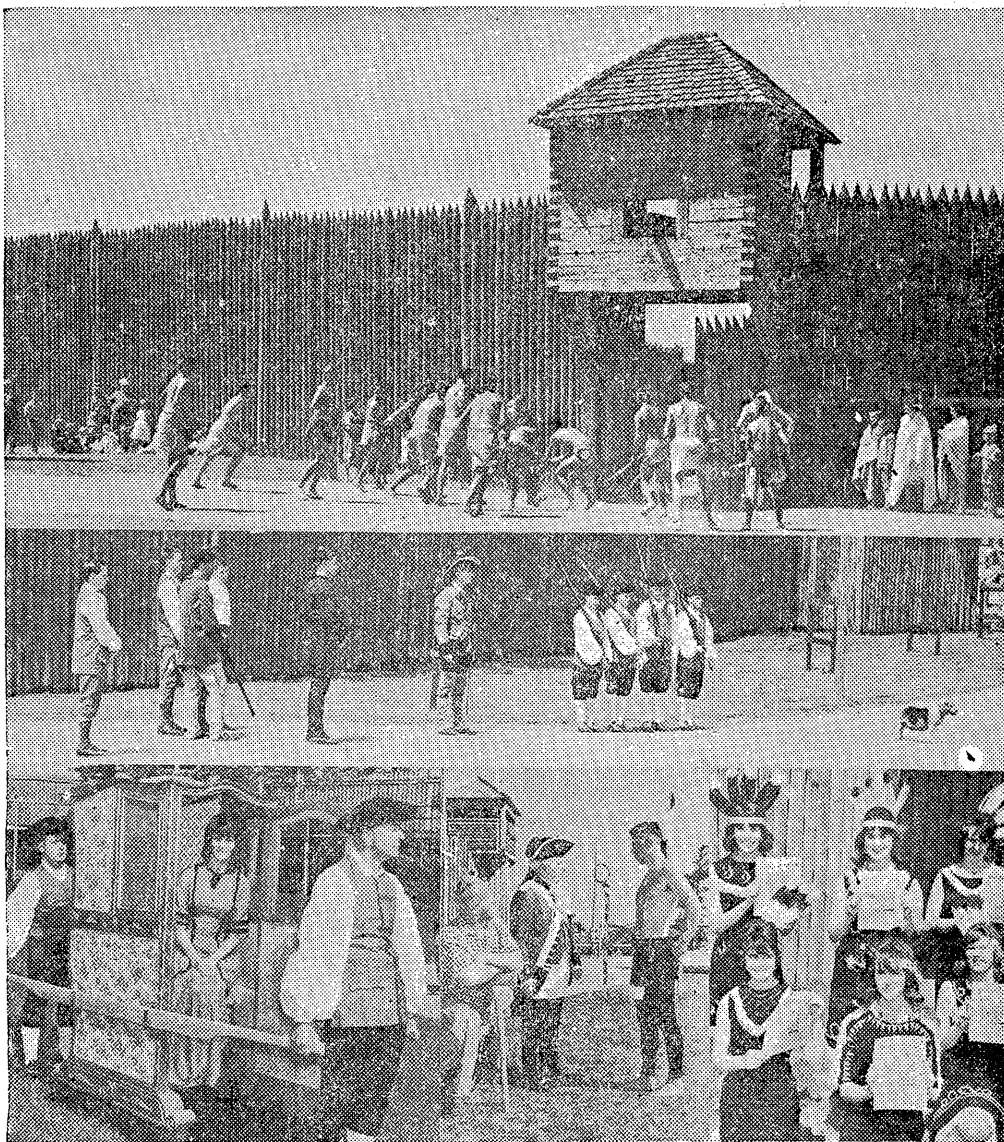
Dr. Markham suggests that the minimum diving exam include a complete medical history, physical exam and full-size chest x-ray. Conditions involving serious lung disease—tuberculosis, asthma or repeated pneumonia—should exclude the person from diving, he said. Other less serious, but potentially hazardous conditions such as chronic ear infections, punctured ear drums or poor teeth and gums also warn against activities which require breathing under increased pressure.

He also recommends a pressure test and oxygen tolerance test for prospective divers. Some individuals react violently to oxygen under increased pressure, he said.

**Some foods may be best frozen commercially but not at home**

The idea that the best quality foods are "home made" doesn't always apply, particularly to frozen foods.

Mrs. Anita Dean, nutrition specialist at Michigan State university, noted that commercial processors can freeze some foods successfully—where the homemaker may fail.

The reason? Equipment and ingredients available to commercial freezers are some that may be very uneconomical for the homemaker, Mrs. Dean comments.

She cites cream pies, cream puffs custards and pudding-type desserts as examples of foods commercially available that the homemaker can't duplicate. "If you've tried to freeze these foods, you've probably found the texture changes when you thaw them. The liquid separates, and because of the type of dish, it can't be stirred in again to improve smoothness," she explains.

Yet you see many creamy desserts in the market. "The commercial freezers use a waxy rice flour instead of the standard wheat flour that homemakers use. But rice flour isn't available to homemakers. It is one of the key ingredients in making desserts, gravies and sauces that freeze successfully," Mrs. Dean observes.

Not all products can be frozen at home with good results because of equipment limitations, she continues. "Many foods are "blast

frozen" commercially. The temperature of the food is lowered very quickly to well below zero and kept there."

In the small home freezer it takes longer to lower the temperature of the food to zero. This is particularly true if large quantities of food are added to the freezer at one time. And, adding large amounts of unfrozen foods can raise freezer temperatures and effect already frozen foods, Mrs. Dean cautions.

To maintain a high quality product, food should be frozen solid within 24 hours after placing in the freezer.

Another factor affecting the quality of home frozen products is the amount of air left in the package. Commercial freezers are able to eliminate most air from the package.

"Making the package moisture and vapor-proof and tight-fitting is one method. Adding a sauce to frozen foods to fill up air spaces is another," Mrs. Dean says.

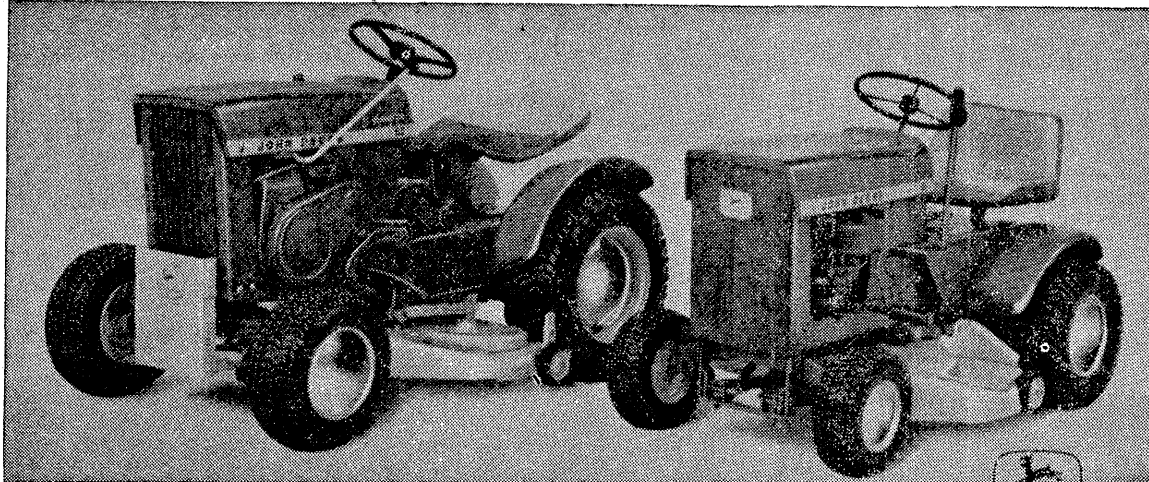

### Marriage now more complicated in Michigan than it used to be

I am frequently asked by citizens of the state for advice with regard to the marriage laws. Therefore, I would like to discuss briefly the various pitfalls contained in the laws of this state regulating marriages.

Prior to Jan. 1, 1957, it was possible to effectuate a legal marriage without obtaining a license and going through the ceremony solemnizing the marriage. This is no longer the case. The consent of both parties is no longer sufficient. All marriages in the state of Michigan in order to be legal must fulfill the two steps required under Michigan law which are, as stated above, the obtaining of a marriage license and the solemnization of the marriage.

This state as well as most states in the United States prohibits the

marriage of certain persons. For example, the laws of this state provide that no man shall marry his mother, grandmother, daughter, daughter, granddaughter, stepmother or other close relatives, including first cousins. A similar provision applies to women as well. The Michigan Supreme court, however, ruled that first cousins who resided in this state could marry in a state where such a marriage is not prohibited, and their marriage would not be void upon their return to the state of Michigan. The basis for this decision was the old rule that if a marriage is valid where contracted, it is valid everywhere. There are exceptions to this rule, of course, for which you should see your personal attorney.

Michigan law also prohibits marriages where either of the parties has a former wife or husband

living, unless the prior marriage who is insane, an idiot, or who has been legally dissolved. Our law also provides that any person who has been afflicted with a venereal disease which has not been cured

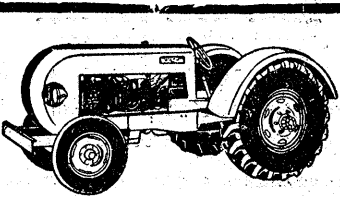

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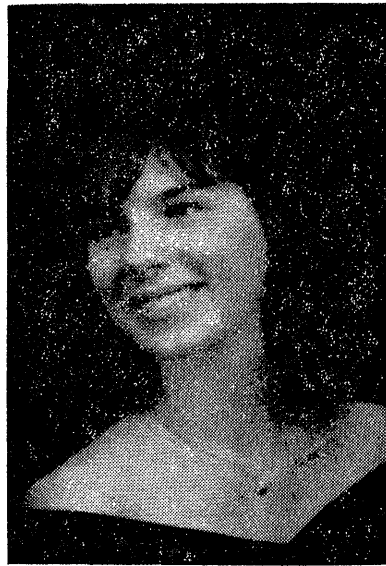

**Therapist goes  
blindfolded to  
help the blind**

Walking the streets of Chicago—blindfolded—was just one of the tests an occupational therapist underwent to prepare a new program for the visually handicapped at the University of Michigan hospital.

Miss Ann Dougherty learned to cross a street by waiting for the parallel traffic to start up. "It's unsafe," she says, "to step off the curb just because cars in your path are stopped." She learned, too that wind bouncing off buildings "gives many clues about a dark environment."

Blind people are not independent unless they can travel alone," she explains. "We want to help patients and blind people throughout Michigan find greater self-confidence."

Detroit and Grand Rapids have centers for training the blind, but the program at University hospital in Ann Arbor will be individualized to fit the needs of each handicapped person.

Services of the newly expanded program, which receives support from the Sister Kenny foundation, include individual instruction on how to "move around" more easily both in the home and outdoors.

For the blind homemaker, a complete model apartment inside University hospital's occupational therapy division provides a training ground. Here the daily chores of cutting meat, flipping a pancake and cooking dinner become a challenge to be conquered.

Miss Dougherty also works with children striving to cope with a suddenly dark world and those who are born blind.

Aluminum canes with a nylon top conduct much information when properly used. Canes best describe what's ahead of the blind person, explains Miss Dougherty. Only two per cent of the blind population are physically able to use a seeing-eye dog. Usually a child is not given a cane until about age 12. After mastering the cane indoors, the program will include instruction in residential and downtown areas.

He has been stationed in Korea since June and is expected to return in July.

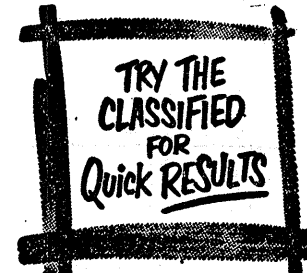
